


Dear Members,
I hope you agree with me that our Island remains a pleasant and safe environment in which to work, play, retire and bring up our families.

Leslie James, Chris Reynolds, Barry Woolford and Graham Wrightson. Your Honorary Officers were: Bob Muid (Secretary) and Lily Leaver (Treasurer).

More recently, Leslie James, who celebrated his 97th birthday this year and has served as a SMIRA Director for over 8 years, has resigned due to failing health. During his period, Leslie has acted as our ears and eyes whilst taking his well known daily walks around the Island.

Leslie never failed to nail me with his concerns and not least of all these was the closing of the caisson. It only seemed right, therefore, that he be asked to cut the ribbon at the official reopening.



I am sure that you would like to join me in thanking Leslie for his many years of service to SMIRA and the Residents and wish him well for his future years of retirement.

All Directors and Officers are, like me, volunteers and I would like to thank them for their support and guidance over the past year. Membership of SMIRA:

Our current membership exceeds 700 and is increasing as the 'build-out' of the final phase of the Island continues.

Membership costs nothing so why not join and be better informed of what we do in your interests and how we may be able to help you should you need it.

So, what have SMIRA achieved during this Financial Year?

Re-opening of the Caisson under the HMS Chatham Bridge:

On the 10th of August 2016 the caisson under HMS Chatham Bridge was re-opened. Since the unannounced closure, SMIRA had urged CMT to try and resolve the matter and they positively responded by negotiating a license with Peel Ports. CMT covered both parties' legal costs, paid for the supply and fitting of

new decking and balustrades and continue to pay for the ongoing maintenance and insurances to cover its use. As soon as the caisson was re-opened, SMIRA convened a meeting with Marina Developments Ltd., Homes and Communities Agency and CMT to see how the rubbish that regularly builds up under the bridge and in the marina could be mitigated. An action plan was agreed and additional low-level mesh panels were fitted to the existing marina perimeter balustrade, the existing open top bins were changed for closed top and additional closed top bins supplied resulting in much improvement. However, any combination of good quality water and sun will result in weed and SMIRA have set up an arrangement with the lock operators that, in addition to the regular weed clearing regime, a call from SMIRA will result in a further rubbish clearing operation, which seems to be working.



Road Adoptions:

Every two months for the last five years SMIRA have held constructive Road Adoption meetings with Medway Council, CMT, our Councilors and the three developers of SMI. Although it has taken a long time and has required the co-operation of all parties, we anticipate that all the sector roads on SMI will be adopted by the end of 2018 and those in the 'build-out', one year after each sector is completed. See below for more details:

Sector 1 (Countryside): Roads – Adopted; Landscaping - Adopted

Sectors 2, 4, 6 & 12 (Countryside): Roads – Adopted; Landscaping – Adopted

Sector 3 (Redrow): Roads – Adopted; Landscaping – will now be adopted by CMT as soon as possible thereafter.

Sector 5 (Barratt's): Roads – Adopted; Landscaping – will now be adopted by CMT as soon as possible thereafter.

Sectors 7, 8, 9 & 14 (Countryside): Roads – To be adopted by September 2018 latest. Landscaping – will then be adopted by CMT as soon as possible thereafter.

Sectors 10, 11, 13 & 15 (Countryside)
These sectors form the 'build-out' of the Island and both the roads and the landscaping will be adopted by a much quicker process as each Sector is completed. In addition, at the request of SMIRA, who were invited to take part in the design of the Master-plan, much of the landscaping and, in some cases residents' gardens, in the 'public realm' will be maintained under a management contract. It is hoped that this will avoid the unfortunate situation that we often see on Central Walk where the visual enjoyment of residents is often blighted by some residents not

maintaining their gardens to a standard in keeping with the adjacent landscaping and 'street scene'.

Island Way West – Additional Zebra Crossings:

Last year I advised you that, given the additional heavy traffic that would be created along Island Way West because of the final 'build-out' of the Island, SMIRA have negotiated two additional Zebra Crossings paid for by Countryside Properties to provide safer access to the Community Centre, Pharmacy and the School. One crossing is to be sited near to Partridge Drive and the other near to the rear of Atlas Place the Independent Living Centre, currently being constructed. This crossing will also provide safer access to the School from the appointed 'drop-off' parking bays planned in the 'build-out'.

However, both crossings have taken longer to develop and design than anticipated but we are advised that construction works will commence reasonably soon.

Island Way East – Mini Roundabout near Goldcrest Drive bus stop:

Many residents must be wondering just what is going on at the mini roundabout near to the Goldcrest Drive bus stop. The new kerbs forming the roundabout were positioned correctly but long wheelbase vehicles, particularly buses, found it difficult to negotiate resulting in substantial damage. Reductions in the adjacent landscaping beds were then implemented but the vehicles were still causing unnecessary and careless damage. More recently, large granite blocks have been positioned to deter vehicles but even this is not working and the problems caused by a combination of excessive speed and poor driving remain a "work in progress".

Covenant Enforcement:

The enforcement of the Covenants by CMT that we all sign up to when buying a property on the Island continues and there has latterly been a focus on rectifying past breaches that have not previously been dealt with. In addition, new sales on the Island 'build-out' and remortgaging have to be dealt with. SMIRA of course encourage and support CMT in carrying out this important task such as to reasonably maintain the 'street scene' that we all enjoy and is the most important issue that resident's charge CMT with when responding to their survey. With this in mind, it is important that residents are minded of the covenants when considering changes to their properties or boundaries and we would very much recommend that they speak to Grant Leathwhite at CMT before applying for planning permission or taking any other action. It is not unusual for planning permission to be granted but there still be a clear and irrevocable breach of the covenants, which could result in difficulty selling your property or remortgaging.

Car Parking on SMI:

Following last year's presentation by Ruth Du-Lieu, Assistant Director of Frontline Services at Medway Council, it is anticipated that a further more specific survey of SMI residents will take place to measure support for a targeted parking permit scheme. The scope of the consultation process is currently being worked on and we anticipate residents receiving more information directly from Medway Council in the New Year.

Increasing Anti-Social Behaviour:

Most residents will be aware of increasing Anti-Social Behaviour, particularly 'groups of youths on bikes', in Chatham Maritime, Medway and the UK generally. This has perhaps come as more of a shock to SMI

residents as we are not used to this kind of ongoing dangerous threat to our lawful and peaceful existence. With this in mind, SMIRA, CMT and our Councillors have set up regular meetings with the Community Safety Unit, headed up by Inspector Rachel Harris at Medway Police Station. These meetings are aimed at keeping residents better informed about reporting incidents and the outcomes where appropriate, as well as how we can all work with the police to mitigate the effect that this recent trend is having. Reporting back to residents will be through the recently formed official SMIRA Residents' Facebook Group and both the SMIRA and CMT websites.

Inspector Rachel Harris has kindly accepted our invitation to attend our AGM, bring us up to date with community safety initiatives in Medway, tell us how we can help, and answer your questions. In addition Matthew Scott, Kent Police and Crime Commissioner, has agreed to come along and tell us what measures he has already taken and what he plans for improving policing in Kent.

St Mary's Island Residents' Facebook Group:

As a result of incorrect, incomplete and sometimes misunderstood information circulating on the St Mary's Island Community Facebook Page, SMIRA Directors decided that a well-managed St Mary's Island Facebook Group Page should be launched that could better act as a conduit of factual information to registered residents only. Personal abuse of any kind is not tolerated and it is hoped that a large number of residents (there are over 400 already) will join and receive constructive information on such matters as security outcomes, events and covenant information. Residents can also use the page to ask questions and seek help and advice on all matters related to living on SMI. If you would like to join, please search Facebook

for SMIRA (St. Mary's Island Residents' Association) Official Group. There are 3 simple questions to answer after which our Admin. Team will approve your application.

Keep Informed:

SMIRA hold residents' meetings on a Tuesday evening approximately every six weeks and we usually have more than 30 residents in attendance. Once you sign-in your contact email at one of our meetings you will automatically be sent our approved minutes. Alternatively, these can be viewed on our website www.smira.info and they will enable you to keep informed and up to date with the range of topics that we deal with. However, if you would like a weekly update of what is going on in and around Chatham Maritime, we would recommend that you go on the CMT website www.cmtrust.co.uk and sign up to receive the "Friday Flyer", which is sent out every Friday by CMT. It costs nothing and contains very useful information as well as giving the latest contact details for key people and associated stakeholders.

SMIRA meetings:

SMIRA meetings are held on Tuesdays on the dates given below at 7:00pm in the Community Centre Meeting Room (all welcome).

Meeting dates for **2018** are: **16 January, 27 February, 10 April, 22 May, 3 July, 14 August, 25 September** and **6th November**. The 2018 SMIRA AGM (open to all) is at 7:30pm on Friday 7th December in the Large Hall.

One to one surgeries with a representative of SMIRA, CMT, Moat Housing and our Ward Councilors take place between 6:00 and 7:00 p.m. From 6:00pm to 7:00pm our PCSO will meet residents in the Community Centre Office if they wish to raise issues confidentially.

SMIRA 2017 AGM:

Our AGM this year takes place on Friday 1st December at the Community Centre commencing at 7:30 p.m. and all Island residents are welcome. The formal business is soon dealt with and this year our guest speakers are:

St Mary's Island Active Retirement Association: SaintARA

SaintARA celebrates its 10th Anniversary next year and remains very active. This year they have been to the theatre twice, enjoyed two 5 day holiday breaks and been on a day-trip to Brighton. The Youth Club continues to grow and now has over 60 registered Members. Apart from regular activities such as snooker, pool, table tennis, badminton, craft and team games, the Club also run 'Theme Nights' where external professional providers come to the Club and provide activities such as 'Street Dance', Volleyball, 'Archery Tag' and 'Nerf Wars'.

They also run a very good not for profit 'Tuck Shop'. Every September they invite new Members from Year 6 of the Island School and they meet most Fridays from 7:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. Thanks go to CMT for their core funding, which supports a 'Youth Leader' and our Ward Councillors who again kindly donated £500 from their ward funds. Most recently they were successful in their application to the 'Streetcops Fund' for a grant of over £400 to finance a new collapsible pool table and some up to date electronic games.

The Club is overseen by a Steering Group of Volunteers and additional Volunteers, many from the Island Church, attend one night a

We are particularly fortunate in that CMT fund the cost of our full time PCSO on Chatham Maritime of which SMI forms a large part.

Although SMI is a relatively safe and pleasant place to live, much of this is due to CMT's increasing CCTV and Security surveillance, the work of the Trust's recently appointed Estate Officer (Carl Davies) and, when required, the Council Community Warden (Chris Harrison).


SMIRA of course maintain good working relations with all those creating and delivering our safe and secure lifestyle, however, much of today's crime and anti social behaviour is solved or prevented by proactive intelligence and information given to the police both before and after the event.

Medway Sunlight Rotary: (The Island Rotary Club)

Over a period of four years, Medway Sunlight Rotary Club, who meet regularly at the Community Centre, have progressively planted over 15,000 purple crocus corms on our Island.



Initially they joined residents in planting on Finsborough Down followed by the Community Centre car park, the path at the adjacent roundabout on Island Way West, which featured as the front page on the SMI 2016 Facebook Calendar and for which they also sponsored the printing costs; the roundabout itself and this year they planted 3,000 corms on Stones Roundabout. Look out for these next spring.

They are now planning to help the children plant 2,000 corms in the School playground and give them ownership and understanding of the significance of the crocuses to the 'End Polio Now Campaign'

Rotary International have played a significant part in this major worldwide disease-eradicating project and so far this year there have only been 11 cases reported in just 2 countries.



The purple crocuses have a significance in that, when the children are immunised by mouth, they are given a sweet and their finger is dyed purple so that they are not tempted to return for another dose!

Medway Sunlight's main fundraising project is of course the Annual Dragon Boat Challenge in Basin 2 as part of the 3 day CMT Food and Drink Festival and, again this year, they raised almost £15,000 for Children's Hospice Holidays and other local, national and international charities.

SMI History Group:

St Mary's Island History Group has been reflecting the commemoration of the Dutch Raid with publications of booklets and also trying to solve a mystery.



There was a major discovery by the Group of original photographs of the building of the basins and docks in the 19th Century. An



Atlas Place, currently being constructed opposite the Community Centre, will provide a 62 unit extra care scheme managed by 'Optivo'. There are 24 double bed shared ownership units and 38 units rented through Medway Council's housing register.

Marketing of the shared ownership units is about to commence and completion is anticipated by mid 2018.

Community Carol Service:

Again this year, on Sunday 17th December, a Carols in the Community Service will be held around the Christmas tree outside the Community Centre commencing at 7:30 p.m. Resident's families and friends are invited to come along and join in this festive occasion. After the service, hot chocolate and mulled wine will be served in the School, which will also be the venue in the event of inclement weather.

Up-Date on the Island Build-Out:

As at the end of October, 77 Plots have been completed and are occupied. There are 128 houses and apartments together with the 62 unit Atlas House Independent Living Centre, a nursery and café all currently under construction and due to be completed in stages by 2019. Sales and marketing of these units – Azure Waters Edge - that lie within the area to the eastern side of the Dry Dock, commenced recently from the show house at Azure.

A new marketing suite, opposite the Independent Living Centre, will open in March 2018.

Plots on the western side of the Dry Dock comprising 124 houses and apartments are set to start in 2018 and complete by 2021.

exhibition in August, which is being repeated, showed just some of the 150 year old views and the remarkable Victorian engineering. Help from our Councillors:

SMIRA would like to acknowledge again the help and guidance that they have received this year from our Ward Councillors, Andrew Mackness and Habib Tejan. It can really make a difference in our discussions, objectives and interface with other Chatham Maritime stakeholders and of course, when working with the Council.

Both Andrew and Habib have asked SMIRA to advise you that they are happy to help anyone to navigate through the sometimes difficult bureaucracy of Medway Council to ensure that your voice is heard. Of course, if you would like to discuss an issue face to face, one of them is usually in attendance at our pre-meeting surgery that takes place at the Community Centre between 6:00 p.m. and 7:00 p.m. before all or regular meetings throughout the year.

SMI School Expansion:

After receiving planning permission, work quickly started at the end of October on the expansion of our Island School to provide a nursery and one additional class each year. The contractors, who are specialists at working in a school environment and understand the 'can and can't do's' around young children, expect all the works to be completed within 12 months.

Each phase of the works will have its own timetable and, at the moment, it is not anticipated that there will be any disruption to the use of the Community Centre car park, Pharmacy or Doctor's Surgery.

SMIRA have already made contact with the Project Manager and Site Manager, Stuart Holland, and contractor parking will only be allowed within the site. However, if any

After three proven warnings, that contractor will not be allowed on site again.

Estate Regulations:

The following are the current adopted Estate Regulations and are intended to promote the enjoyment and good management of St. Mary's Island. Residents are asked to strictly adhere to these regulations in the courteous interest and well being of others.

- Dogs shall be kept on a lead at all times in the amenity and other public areas of the Estate.
- The designated gated and fenced dog-run area on Finsborough Down is the only area of public space where dogs can be let off their lead. Dog owners should be aware that Medway Council now enforce the Control of Dogs act (Medway) 2014.

The following activities are prohibited:

- Horse riding on any part of the Estate.
- The launching of boats, jet skis and other similar watercraft from the Estate into the river.
- The landing of aircraft and hot air balloons on any part of the Estate.
- Fishing in the River Medway from the Estate and in the Dock Basins.
- Swimming from the foreshore within the Estate and in the Dock Basins.
- The trapping or killing of wildlife on the Estate (save as part of a proper pest control operation).
- The flying of model aircraft and the sailing of model boats from the foreshore within the Estate and in the Dock Basins.
- The lighting of fires and barbecues on the Amenity Areas.
